


A Welcome back message from the Principal

CRAIGIEBURN SECONDARY COLLEGE ATTENDANCE SUMMARY

Welcome back! We appreciate your ongoing support in achieving 100% attendance—every day and minute counts.

Absence Communication:

Automated Messages: Parents receive text messages at 10 AM and 3 PM for absences.

Weekly Emails: Unexplained absences trigger Monday emails via Compass.

Reporting Absences: Use Compass, email, or call 9308 1144 to provide reasons and estimated return dates.

Attendance Expectations:

DET requires a **90%** attendance rate for student success.

School events, and sports days are compulsory.

The '2-hour rule' means students must attend at least two hours in the morning and afternoon to be marked present.

Managing Lateness & Truancy:

Chronic lateness can lead to disengagement. Unexplained lateness results in Compass emails and demerits.

Truancy notifications are sent if students are out of class without permission.

Support for Attendance Concerns:

Families with attendance below **90%** receive Compass alerts, support plans, and school interventions.

Chronic absenteeism may involve DET referrals for further support.



SCHOOL SAVING BONUS (SSB) HOW IT CAN HELP OUR FAMILES

The School Saving Bonus program provides a one-off \$400 support to Victorian government school students from Prep to Year 12 for the 2025 school year.

Parents and carers received an email from the Department of Education starting on **November 26, 2024**, containing a unique code to access the bonus via an online system.

Families can allocate the funds towards school activities, uniforms, textbooks, or a combination of these.

Online access to the School Saving Bonus will expire on June 30, 2025. Any unspent balance after this date will automatically transfer to the family's account at the school for future use.










CELEBRATING POSITIVE BEHAVIOR: SWPBS Merit Spotlight

At CSC, we acknowledge and encourage expected behaviours by awarded students with 'merits'.


As they continue to demonstrate these behaviours and our school values, student merits accumulate, and they can use these by 'cashing in' to redeem a reward of their choice from their year level space.

CAREERS AT CSC EMPOWERING OUR STUDENTS FOR THE FUTURE

We are excited to share our school's comprehensive careers program, designed to support and guide our students through the evolving world of work. In line with the Victorian Government's initiative, transforming careers education, we are committed to equipping students with the skills, knowledge, and opportunities to make informed career choices. This initiative aims to ensure that careers education is embedded into the curriculum, preparing students for success beyond secondary school.

Craigieburn Secondary College's careers curriculum is structured to guide students through a thoughtful and progressive journey of career exploration, with each year level focusing on a specific aspect of career development. In Year 7, students begin with "I Discover," where they learn about their strengths, interests, and the broad range of career possibilities available to them. Year 8 follows with "I Explore," helping students broaden their understanding of different industries and begin to link personal interests to potential career paths.

In Year 9, the focus shifts to "I Focus," where students use tools like the Morrisby program to evaluate their skills and preferences and refine their career interests. Year 10 is "I Plan," where students participate in our Work Experience program to gain realworld exposure to potential careers and start planning their future steps. Year 11 students enter "I Decide," refining their post-school options and exploring further education and training pathways. Finally, in Year 12, students move to "I Apply," preparing for university applications, apprenticeships, or entering the workforce, depending on their goals.

Throughout the year, we invite guest speakers from a variety of industries to engage with students. These experts provide valuable insights into the skills required in different sectors and share real-world experiences that help students understand the practicalities of careers they can or are exploring. These speakers serve as a bridge between classroom learning and the broader world of work, allowing students to connect theory to practice.

By integrating career education into every year level, we aim to empower our students with the knowledge and experiences needed to make confident, informed decisions about their futures. We are excited to continue supporting them as they explore and pursue their career aspirations.

PATHWAYS VETDSS PROGRAM

In Week 3 this term, 27 of our Vocational Major students attended Kangan Institute to begin their VET Delivered to Secondary Students (VETDSS) course. 16 Year 11s began their first year of their program while 11 of our Year 12 students returned to complete their second and final year. VETDSS enables our students to get real hands-on experience within a chosen industry, obtain a nationally recognised qualification and increase their career prospects by combining their secondary school studies with a Vocational Education and Training (VET) program.

Studying an external VET, provides our students with the skills and ability to achieve competencies which will enhance their employment and further training prospects, delivers 'work-ready' knowledge and skills applicable to a variety of career paths in their chosen industry and may shorten the duration

of an apprenticeship program after Year 12 through credit recognition. Some of the courses begun and continued by our students include pre-apprenticeships in Building and Construction, Electrotechnology and Automotive (Mechanical and Autobody). We also have students completing their Certificate II in Early Childhood Education and Beauty Services. These courses are completed one day a week at the Kangan Broadmeadows, Docklands and Cremorne campuses. Our

students' participation in these courses demonstrates the many benefits of the alternative learning

pathway that the Vocational Major énables. We would like to acknowledge and congratulate Brodie Diver of Year 12 who achieved the VET Student of the Year award for his outstanding work in the pre-apprenticeship of Electrotechnology at Kangan. We would also like to congratulate Husain Al Jibury and Nissan Nissan of Year 12 who have both been offered School-based Apprenticeships through our Head Start program. These students are now able to transfer their skills and learning acquired throughout their pre-apprenticeship to part-time employment in carpentry, and get a head start on their apprenticeships while still at school. The Pathways team and our wider school community would like to congratulate the below students for pursuing their external studies and we look forward to watching their progress and success. The secondary school vaccine program helps ensure students and communities are protected from diseases such as diphtheria, tetanus, whooping cough, human papillomavirus and chicken pox.

Every day immunisation saves lives and makes it possible for Victorians to live free from illness and the disability caused by many infectious diseases. All Victorian secondary students can receive these vaccines free through the school-based program.

Year 10 Immunisations: Monday 12th of May 2025 Type: Meningococcal A, C, W, Y (Nimenrix)

Your children's school Immunisation Program is going digital which means there will be no more paper consent cards floating around school bags or 'lost' before they are due to be handed in.

The system the Hume City Council are using is called VaxApp and is simple to use and update your children's information at any time.

More importantly, afterschool Homework Club, CHAC and lunchtime sessions your child is guaranteed excellent opportunities in strengthening their study skills.

Here are key essential tips and skills for families and students to engage with at home outside of school time:

Establishing a morning routine and promoting healthy sleeping habits to ensure readiness for learning.

Identify your individual study preferences and determining the most effective study methods for them.

Using the school diary to jot down important notes, deadlines, and create checklists for daily or weekly goals.

Time Management: by setting up schedules and prioritizing tasks and commitments Homework Completion: dedicate a minimum of 30 minutes to an hour per subject daily to homework tasks.

Work-Life Balance: Supporting students in balancing any part-time job responsibilities with their schoolwork and other commitments.


