Absence Communication:

Automated Messages: Parents receive text messages at 10 AM and 3 PM for absences.

Weekly Emails: Unexplained absences trigger Monday emails via Compass.

Reporting Absences: Use Compass, email, or call 9308 1144 to provide reasons and estimated return dates.

Attendance Expectations:

DET requires a **90%** attendance rate for student success.

School events and sports days are compulsory.

The '2-hour rule' means students must attend at least two hours in the morning and afternoon to be marked present.

Managing Lateness & Truancy:

Chronic lateness can lead to disengagement.
Unexplained lateness results in Compass emails and demerits.
Truancy notifications are sent if students are out of class without permission.

Support for Attendance Concerns:

Students with attendance below **90%** will receive; Compass alerts, support plans, and school interventions.

Chronic absenteeism may involve DET referrals for further support.

INGREDIENTS:

125 GRAMS (4OZ) BUTTER, CHOPPED
2 TABLESPOONS GOLDEN SYRUP OR TREACLE (SEE TIP)
1/2 TEASPOON BICARBONATE OF SODA (BAKING SODA)
2 TABLESPOONS BOILING WATER
1 CUP (90G) ROLLED OATS
1 CUP (150G) PLAIN (ALL-PURPOSE) FLOUR
1 CUP (220G) FIRMLY PACKED BROWN SUGAR
3/4 CUP (60G) DESICCATED COCONUT


The one-day event brought together high-ability students from across Victoria to engage with leading industry professionals from a range of STEM fields.

The sessions showcased real-world applications of science: technology, engineering, and mathematics, such as infectious disease modelling, injury prevention, personalised digital marketing, and vehicle safety systems.

Students also learned about subject pathways and career journeys of each speaker, gaining valuable insights into future study and job opportunities in STEM. It was an enriching and motivating experience that sparked curiosity.

Year 7:




"EXPLORING FUTURES: YEAR 10S CAREERS EXPO"

In Week 5 of Term 2, our Year 9 Forensic Science classes took part in a hands-on excursion at University High School, near the University of Melbourne.


Students rotated through interactive workshops led by Tony, Nicole, and university demonstrators, applying their Term 1 learning in real-world scenarios.

Activities included fingerprint analysis, microscopy, DNA gel electrophoresis, blood typing, and examining financial records in a mock environmental crime case.


All students were highly engaged, with many showing great leadership. We look forward to more exciting science experiences in Semester 2!






UNIT 3 CHEMISTRY EXCURSION UNIVERSITY OF MELBOURNE

HOLIDAY FUN: CHEMISTRY IN THE KITCHEN

INGREDIENTS:

250ml boiling water 2 tsp McKenzie's Citric Acid 1 tbs McKenzie's Gelatine Powder 2 x 9g packets of Lite Jelly Crystals

DIRECTIONS

Step 1

Pour boiling water into a jug. Add citric acid, gelatin and jelly crystals. Whisk for 1 minute making sure that all the crystals have dissolved.

STEP 2

Pour the mixture into a tin lined with baking paper. Place into fridge to set for 2 hours.

STEP 3

Once set, cut the jelly into snakes or bite size pieces.

A cold start greeted us—grey skies, a gentle mist and the whisper of rain on the horizon.

"Is this what a sunrise looks like?" Miss Gabby asked, smiling as the first light pushed through the clouds.

The **Mana Day Camp** was not just an excursion; it was a spiritual and leadership journey—a chance to grow, connect and challenge us.

By 6:30am, students began arriving to school, wrapped in warm clothes and anticipation. A shared breakfast of Up & Go and banana bread, followed by final instructions from our teacher-leaders, set the tone for the day. Four buses departed at 7:15am, heading for **Kinglake Adventure Park**, nestled 56 kilometres northeast of Melbourne.

As we climbed higher into the mountains, mist cloaked the road and the hills, and a fine drizzle hinted at the tests ahead.

Attendance

The Business Academy aims to engage students by catering to their interest in entrepreneurship, business and applied learning. In 2023, there was a need to cater for this as class attendance in VCE VM was low. Since the introduction of the Business Academy, attendance has risen by 36% year on year. Further demonstrating the need to cater to students interests and linking the learning in the classroom to the real-world. Attendance across Year 11 and 12 continues to remain a key focus of the program

Business Academy modules

In 2024, the Business Academy was established with one class in Year 12 VCE VM. In 2025, the Business Academy expanded into Year 11 and Year 12 VCE VM with one class in each year level. As such, the modules that students complete have also changed. In Year 12, students complete all 8 modules whereas Year 11 students complete 4 modules in Year 11 and 4 modules in Year 12. This allows for further exploration into the topics and greater range of activities.

Business Academy behaviour

Craigieburn Secondary College records and reports on student behaviour through the Grade Point Average (GPA). Similar to school process, the Business Academy also record and report student behaviour through the GPA. It is an expectation before students are accepted into the Business Academy that they will maintain a 3.0 GPA. Since the introduction of the 3.0 GPA expectation as part of the application process, Business Academy students GPA has risen by 25% year on year and observations regarding Business Academy student behaviour has been positive. This has also been reflected in student engagement and academic performance. Congratulations to several students who have received above a 3.0 GPA for the first time as well as students who have increased their GPA's from 2024.

WINTER GARDENING TIPS



Kale

Grow in Cool Weather – Autumn or early spring is best. Sunny Spot, Rich Soil – Add compost or veggie fertiliser. Space 30–45 cm Apart – Water regularly and mulch. Harvest Outer Leaves – Start when leaves are 10–15 cm long.



Carrots

Sow in Spring or Autumn – Cool temps make sweeter carrots.

Loose, Deep Soil – Remove rocks for straight roots. Sow Thinly – 1 cm deep, 2–3 cm apart. Keep moist. Harvest – After 8–12 weeks, when roots are firm and visible.



Cauliflower

Sow in Cool Weather – Late summer to early autumn is ideal.

Rich Soil & Sun – Needs compost and plenty of light.

Plant 45–60 cm Apart – Water regularly; mulch helps.

Harvest – When head is firm, white, and compact (10–12 weeks).



Broccoli

Plant in Cool Seasons – Sow in late summer or early autumn.

Full Sun & Fertile Soil – Add compost; well-drained is best.

Space & Water – Plant 40–50 cm apart. Keep soil moist. Harvest – Pick when heads are tight and firm (8–12 weeks).





